Executive Director Report

Board input. Let's discuss:

- Board member recommendations Laura Moore. Met after the Clover meeting. James Thompson is on with us. Shardai Brown is also on with us. We've identified 4 more openings and potential candidates. We're in conversation with them and it looks promising
- TC, LM, and RH attended the Lake Wylie rotary club meeting in Clover. They purchased \$1000 worth of books from us and they had a sticker party at their meeting.
- The Right To Read documentary Discussion? Evidenced Based Practices? it is one in a series that has come to the forefront recently. The discussion is about teaching children to read and how it isn't science backed. Across the country, reading levels are in the 40% range. Even though we're not targeting the schools, the KRA scores mirror these same numbers. The average in York County is 38%. It really speaks to our mission and what we're doing. The point was that we're not using science backed methods and not being equitable. The BIPOC community is really being affected and the NAACP is saying that this is an issue
 - LAW: This was enlightening and disappointing
 - SE: Once again, this is a hidden discriminatory thing in our society as we continue to look for ways not to be hurtful and it's sad
 - We're not here to point fingers at the school districts. They have mandates that they are required to follow. This is a systems oriented approach. We're here to open our eyes and acknowledge that our work is SO important. When ROR provides animal sounds books, they're the sounding piece of vowels but not phonics
 - MW: I'm listening and I'm shaking my head. I have to share" I was doing a meal for Family promise.
 We have 4 children this week. The 6yo little girl was so excited b/c she had 3 books in her hand. One of them was from McDonalds. She immediately hopped on my lap and I read to her. This is so important to engage with a child reading and get them excited about it
 - LAW: When we talk about what we do, you can just SEE the effect

"In the Know" – Education Workgroup

Presenter: Courtney & Janet

- Guest Presenter, Dr. Shardai Brown PhD from MUSC. CG: Professors from Winthrop. Since then, she's now at Aperture Education. I hope you had a chance to hear the podcast. We've been including adult material b/c adult involvement is so important in our nb to 5yo age group.
 - DL: most child care are having difficulty hiring and keeping staff and most are understaffed. Undervalued, underappreciated. Clients are having a difficult time affording
 - DM: Echoing what David said, it weighs heavy the providers say this is what the child is presenting and if I could, I would xyz but I can't b/c I don't have the staff. Same at the high school. Special ed teachers

are leaving because they have the skills but the support staff isn't given the education they need to feel adequate. Turnover is high. We need to see what can we do to support

- TF: I think they're a lot of issue related to teacher burnout (and I don't like that term). Has to do with funding, has to do with appreciation but we need to look at instructional leadership to provide them the support they need. Effective teaching and effective schools is deeply impacted by instructional leadership support.
- o Support from the top down, peers, staff, and having the necessary skills
- LAW: I worked in a high behavioral needs environment. It wasn't the children that I struggled with. It was the leadership and support that increased my stress.
- SB: Get familiar with CASEL-5 and the core competencies.
- TC: Everywhere you had the word teachers, you could also use the word families. Whatever system you're working in, like the oxygen mask on the airplane, you have to take care of yourself before effectively taking care of others
